Curriculum information

Our topic in term 3 is 'What's the weather like outside?'



This term, we will be learning all about different types of weather and what to wear. Our new topic means we will be learning about weather reports, how these can be recorded and how the weather changes each day. Additionally, we will be role playing writing and mapping where different types of weather will be on our own UK map.

We will be looking at what to wear in different types of weather and how this is affected by the weather. In maths this term, we will be continuing to develop ways to represent numbers 1 to 10, whilst practising adding, subtracting and finding the total using these mathematical symbols +, -, =. We will be continuing to find one more/less. We will also begin to learn about capacity, using vocabulary such as full, empty, by collecting rainfall. In literacy, we will be recapping all the sounds and tricky words in Phase 2 and continuing to develop our ability to segment and blend sounds to form CVC (consonant-vowel-consonant) words. We will be incorporating how to write these sounds correctly using cursive handwriting.

To celebrate the Chinese New Year of the Pig, Peridot will be learning their own Chinese Dance during their workshop on Tuesday 22nd January.

## Home learning

Create a weather report by noting what the weather is like each day. Additionally, you can create a weather dance, song related to the weather, art work, videoed weather report etc.

Please could you ensure your child has their P.E kit in school. **Please remove earrings on these days** - this is an important health and safety issue.



## Reading books

Each week your child is listened to reading their book, as well as reading in different situations e.g. games. Books are changed every **Monday and Thursday**.

Please make sure books are in everyday.

When reading, encourage your child to point to each word and ask your child to sound out each sound e.g c-a-t then blending sounds (squashing it together) to create the word. Encourage your child to identify tricky words.

Your child can also borrow books from our **school's Swap Shop**. However, please remember to bring books back before swapping to get a new book.

## How can you help at home?

Please support your child to continue to practice writing their name in cursive.

- Practising letter sounds and tricky words eg. the, and, I, no, go, to, the, into, me, he, be.
- Practising counting and recognising numbers to 20.
- Recognise numbers and letters in the environment.
- Reading to your child and listening to your child reading.
- Blending sounds already learnt to make words e.g. c-a-t, p-e-g
- Using scissors.
- Getting dressed and undressed.
- Recognising 2D shapes in the environment and describing their properties e.g a triangle has 3 corners and 3 straight sides.

Letters and money

## Please bring a named bag into school everyday.
