



Meeting all children's needs

If your child is vision impaired or finds printed books tricky, your library may be able to help suggest alternatives. 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Why is reading for pleasure important?*

- Currently, 1 in 5 children in England cannot read well by the age of 11. We know that reading for fun improves literacy.
- Reading for pleasure is more important to children's academic success than their parents' level of education or socio-economic status.
- Embedding a love of reading in children can help their wellbeing later in life. 19% of adult readers say that reading stops them feeling lonely.
- Studies have found that those who read for pleasure have higher levels of empathy, greater self-esteem and are better able to cope with difficult situations.

The Summer Reading Challenge gets around 700,000 children into libraries each year to keep up their reading skills and confidence during the long holidays. It's fun, it's free and it's local!

From September, the school will be welcoming the Swale Mental Health Support Team, who will be consolidating existing wellbeing initiatives within the school and offering low-intensity guided self-help for children with anxiety and common behavioural difficulties.

This work will be 1:1 with parents, parent group interventions for child anxiety, as well as tailored group sessions and workshops depending on the needs of the school. The Team will be offering introductory workshops in September and further information will be provided in the new academic year.

Online Safety Update

What is 'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite'?

'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' is an augmented reality (AR) game from the developers behind <u>Pokémon Go</u> and uses your GPS and camera to locate fantastic beasts and famous faces from the Harry Potter series in real life places.



In the game, players can collect monsters, items and characters, called 'foundables' by walking around their local community and casting spells to capture them. Each spellcasting takes a unit of 'Energy'; additional energy can be purchased with coins or replenished by eating at 'inns', which are positioned at local landmarks such as statues, pubs, train stations and parks. Alternatively, landmarks may be designated as 'Greenhouses', which offer up ingredients you can use to brew potions, or 'Fortresses', in which you do battle with monsters and evil 'Death Eaters'

There are also 'Portmanteaus' which can only be opened by walking with them for a certain distance in order to release rewards. Players can also take part in daily challenges, such as walking a set distance or visiting a certain number of 'Inns'.

What should parent and carers be aware of in 'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite'?

There are a range of potential risks for 'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' players which are similar to those encountered with the launch of <u>Pokémon Go</u> in 2016. While 'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' can generally be considered a family-friendly app, there are some specific risks involved that parents and players should be aware of and some advice on how they can be minimised:

Boundaries and personal safety:

•'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' encourages users to explore the surrounding area. Players may potentially place themselves at risk by walking into or trespassing in secluded, dangerous or busy areas, or by using the app when spatial awareness is required.

- Establish ground rules as a family about where younger players can and cannot go whilst playing the game (e.g. pubs, parks etc.).
- Ensure children are aware of physical safety risks, such as not playing the game whilst crossing roads or entering unsafe areas or private properties.

•This game is designed to be played in groups. Going out and playing the game with your child can help to establish clear ground rules and expectations about safe behaviour. Plus, you never know, you all might have some fun with it too!

Online friends and stranger danger:

•'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' encourages players to visit public places and to tackle challenges with other players; this may be with their real-world friends or other people at the same location. Tougher 'Fortress' challenges require more than one player, so some users may feel compelled to meet, speak to and collaborate with strangers at these locations.

- Ensure your child is aware of the risks of gaming with and/or meeting people they don't know; devise a plan of action (such as 'run and tell') if they feel unsafe.
- It is strongly recommended that children only play 'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' whilst supervised by an appropriate adult.

•Users are also encouraged to add friends within the game by sharing unique friend codes; once added, 'friends' have access to a limited amount of in-game information.

- Discuss 'online friendship' with your child and set boundaries for who they should and shouldn't be adding in the game.
- Ensure they know not to share personal information or contact details with online friends.

Battery life and data usage:

•'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' uses GPS to place players within the world, which can drain a phone's battery quickly. This may leave users vulnerable if they are unable to use their device; for example, to contact their parents/carers.

- Ensure mobile phones are fully charged before setting out and take a charger or battery pack so it can still be used in emergencies.
- To conserve battery power whilst playing the game, consider turning 'battery saver mode' on and the AR element of the game off in the settings.

•The game also requires Wi-Fi or 3/4G access to work; this can have a cost implication depending on your mobile phone contract and data allowance.

• Investigate your data package with your mobile device provider and set a usage limit to prevent unexpected bills or charges.

Privacy and Set-up:

•'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' asks you to sign up to its services via a Facebook or Google account, which could mean your data is shared between these companies.

- Consider creating a Facebook or Google account specifically for signing up to the game.
- Ensure that you read the terms and conditions and check/uncheck the appropriate data sharing and privacy options.
- For players under 13, consider registering for a Niantic Kids account; this requires parents to use their credit card to verify their identify and provide consent for their child to play. This type of account allows parents to enable or disable a range of social features for their child and removes sponsored locations from the map.

Screen-time balance:

•Daily assignments, real-time challenges and rewards for daily use may encourage players to spend more time using their device than they normally would.

- Set screen-time limits, encourage children to take regular screen breaks and acknowledge that daily use may not always be possible.
- Turn off 'daily reminder' notifications in settings to prevent the game from re-engaging or distracting children from offline activities.
- Lead by example; consider how much time you spend on your own device and ensure you rolemodel a positive screen-time balance for your children.

In-app purchasing:

•Whilst the game is free to download and play, it does allow in-app purchasing. Real money can be used to buy virtual goods, such as potion ingredients and spell-energy; players can burn through spell energy quickly and can't do much in the game without it, so it can be tempting to purchase more.

- Ensure your child understands in-app purchases and can recognise the difference between spending virtual coins and real money in the game.
- Talk to your child about whether you will or won't allow them to spend their own, or your money in the game.
- Set appropriate controls on your child's device to restrict or remove the ability to make in-app purchases.

It is important to recognise that these potential risks are not new to children, or adults who may play the game, either online or in the "real" world. If parents/carers are engaged with their children's internet use and offer appropriate supervision and support, then many of these potential risks can be minimised and managed. Arguably, 'Harry Potter: Wizards Unite' offers many benefits that other online games don't, by encouraging children and families to be active and socialise together. This can provide an opportunity for parents/carers, and indeed educational settings, to engage in the online world with children and explore important on/offline safety messages, as well as their local communities. Some reports even suggest that gaming apps like this may benefit mental health, as well as physical activity.

We had a very successful day down at Bell Road looking at our cupcakes , which have now been placed in the planters, and meeting the judges with our display. They were very impressed as to what we had done and loved the ideas that we had all created.

Attendance

This year, we have worked very hard to ensure that your children have every opportunity to be in school every day and on time. To those of you who have supported us with this and ensured your child attends school we thank you! We have supported families with lifts for children in exceptional circumstances so that they can come to school, taken families to appointments so that their children can remain in school, and supported families with funding for Breakfast Club and After School Club so that again children can be in school when their parents need to be elsewhere.

We strive to ensure that all children are happy at school and want to come and learn. We know that there are times when some children feel anxious or an incident occurs that upsets them. We have a very highly skilled and dedicated Wellbeing Team, as well as amazing teaching staff and teaching assistants, who support children as the need arises.

We are bound by strict regulations around attendance and always have your children's best interests and safety at heart when phoning, texting and making house calls to check they are ok.

We have run 6 termly Attendance Cinemas for the 100% termly attenders. We have given the children who achieved 99% or above for the whole year a fun time on bouncy castles on Thursday, this week, to say well done and pulled out Tyler G from the end of year prize draw for all those achieving 100% across the year. Tyler will be receiving a BMX bike.

Given all of the support and incentives in place we have only achieved 95.7% attendance this year, far below that of last year. The resounding reason for this dip is due to holiday taken in term time. This year 95 children have taken 1018 sessions of absence. This is far more than in any other year. One child attends for 390 sessions in a year so holiday taken this year is equivalent to almost 3 children having a whole year off of school!! May we remind you that we are not permitted to authorise holiday in term time. We accept that holidays are cheaper in term time, but your child is missing out on vital learning, which will have a detrimental impact on their schooling. So PLEASE ensure that your children are in school to learn and that holiday is taken in the school holidays.

We will continue to offer support to ensure that your children can attend school. If for any reason you need support please do contact us, we will always endeavour to do all we can to help families when circumstances are challenging.

Please make sure that you are fully aware of our term dates and staff development days. We look forward to seeing you all back on Wednesday 4th September 2019.

I thought it might be helpful to remind parents of our uniform code at South Avenue, as I know that the Summer holiday is the time when new uniform is purchased, ready for our return in September. Details can be found in our prospectus and also on the school website at http://www.southavenue.kent.sch.uk/Uniform Uniform can be purchased in Sittingbourne from Forsters School Outfitters, 17-19 East Street, Sittingbourne (Tel: 01795 472947) or follow the link on http://www.forsterskent.co.uk/south-avenue-primary-school-139-c.asp

Red jumper/fleece/cardigan (these can be purchased with or without the school logo) Grey or black trousers/skirt/pinafore (Not leggings); White shirt/polo shirt

Sensible, flat, black shoes - trainers, ankle boots or 'DM' type boots should not be worn. Shoes with heels, flip flops or open toes are not appropriate for school and should not be worn. Shoes with laces should only be worn if your child can tie them themselves. If children arrive in school wearing trainers you will be contacted to bring in the appropriate footwear, or your child may be given a pair of black gym shoes to wear until black school shoes can be provided. If ears are pierced, plain, one colour studs no larger than 0.5cm, may be worn. These must be removed for PE lessons by the child. If your child is not able to remove them, parents should remove them before school. If your child is going to have their ears pierced please ensure this is done at the beginning of the summer holiday. A watch may also be worn if your child can tell the time. This will need to be removed for PE lessons. Long hair must be tied back - in addition to looking neat and tidy, this can help to avoid the spread of head lice should they occur occasionally at school. Children are not expected to attend school with some of the more 'extreme' hair styles – e.g. hair extensions, dyed hair or shaved patterns in hair. These are not suitable for school and better left for holiday time.

- \checkmark Girls may wear tights if these are in plain colours such as white, cream, grey, red or black.
- Socks for boys or girls should be black, grey or white
- ✓ During summer: red and white checked dress/grey/black shorts
- In bad weather, pupils may wear boots to school and then change into their usual school shoes.
- A complete change of clothing for PE is required. We encourage children to ensure they have their PE kit in school on the first day of each term and take this home to be washed at the end of term. All PE kit should be in a separate named PE bag. Plain white T-shirt and red shorts. Junior children should also have plain tracksuit bottoms & a longsleeved top. Children should wear separate footwear from that worn to school and for the remainder of the school day. This should be plimsolls or trainers for outdoor PE. For safety reasons, particularly when using the apparatus, PE lessons in the hall take place with all children bare footed.

Children who are not properly dressed for PE may not be allowed to take part. All PE activities are an integral part of the curriculum and, therefore, children unable to take part in PE must bring a note to school giving reasons for their temporary incapacity and, if possible, its duration. Verbal messages from the child are not acceptable. Should a child regularly not bring his/her kit to school and therefore miss lessons, parents will be notified of the school's concern and seek support to ensure this vital subject is not missed.



What will you be doing with your child's old school uniform this summer?
