We are delighted to welcome all of Year 2 back into school and are looking forward to a very exciting term ahead!

Our **Topic** this term is all about inspirational people and how we celebrate differences. We will be learning about what being inspirational means to us and how we are all special, along with studying the lives of **Florence Nightingale** and **Mary Seacole** - who both changed nursing for the better. We will also be looking at the geography of England (where Florence Nightingale lived) and Jamaica (where Mary Seacole was born).

In **English**, we will be writing diary entries to record a day in the life of Florence Nightingale, writing a biography for Mary Seacole, writing a letter to a farmer about the Harvest and creating our own spooky Halloween story and poem.

In **Phonics**, we will be re-capping the Phase 3, 4 and 5 sounds. Additionally, we will begin to learn spelling rules linked to our phonics knowledge.

In **Maths,** this term, we will be working on number and place value, addition and subtraction and will be using our skills to solve problems.

Our **Art** this term, will be around inspirational British artists and we will be learning about Joseph Turner. We will be looking at the skill of capturing the light and will use this to create our own paintings.

In **R.E.** we will be looking at the topic of Creation, discussing and investigating the ways in which Christians believe the world was created.

For **Science**, we will be looking at the way in which the human body changes as it grows. This includes learning about what humans need to grow, such as exercise and healthy foods.

In P.E. this term, we will be taking part in multi-skills and dodgeball.


Science Animals including Humans
